Conclusions

- Small bowel obstruction after a RYGB can be challenging to manage and cannot be managed conservatively
- Internal hernia is often the expected cause, however other rarer differential diagnosis must be considered.
- The operative management may require reconstructing the RYGB and should be managed by surgeons who
 have bariatric surgery experience if possible
