Indications and Coverage of Metabolic and Bariatric Surgery:
A Worldwide IFSO Survey Comparing Different National Guidelines

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**Survey:** Sixty-three out of the 72 IFSO national societies answered the form (87.5%)

74.6% have some kind of guidelines regarding indications for MBS.

22% are still based on the NIH 1991 recommendations,

43.5% possess guidelines midway the 1991s and 2022 ones

34% have already adopted the 2022 guidelines.

MBS was financially covered in 65% of the countries

Please note that OAGB or other operations under development can be legally performed in France, they are just not reimburdsed by social security (in France = not performed in practice).



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### 43-member expert panel

There were **26 bariatric surgeons** including 2 pediatric bariatric surgeons, among whom 11 also performed endoscopic bariatric procedures.

The remaining expert panel members were four endoscopists, eight endocrinologists, one internist, one pediatrician, two nutritionists, and two counsellors (psychology, exercise).

# IFSO Consensus Conference 2023 Section 1. Definitions and Reporting Standards

## Former "non responder":

In general, a <u>suboptimal initial clinical response</u> to MBS is demonstrated either by total body weight or BMI loss of less than 20%

#### OR

by inadequate improvement in an obesity complication that was a significant indication for surgery.



# IFSO Consensus Conference 2023 Section 1. Definitions and Reporting Standards

## Former "weight recurrence/failure"

In general, a **late post-operative clinical deterioration** after MBS is demonstrated **either** by a <u>recurrent weight gain</u> of more than **30%** of the initial surgical weight loss <u>OR</u> by worsening of an obesity complication that was a significant indication for surgery and that occurs after an initially adequate post-operative clinical response.

Given the different average effectiveness of different MBS procedures, and variable effects in different populations, these criteria should be applied to individual patients in the context of expert clinical judgement.

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## Conclusion



- Obesity as a **chronic relapsing disease** requires different interventions (surgical, endoscopic, pharmaceutical, etc.)
- Surgical interventions have demonstrated long-term durable success
- Importance of evidence based treatment in bariatric/metabolic patients
- Several **new therapy options** available (Indications: Weight regain? Low BMI patients? etc.)
